## **Guidelines for Authors**

*Tree Planters' Notes* is dedicated to technology transfer and publication of research information relating to nursery production and outplanting of native and introduced trees and shrubs for reforestation, restoration, and conservation.

**Nonresearch technical articles**—Please submit an article if you have successfully used a new piece of equipment (including computer applications), developed a new method for enhancing seedling quality (including tree improvement and pest management applications), a new technique for site preparation or planting, or another aspect of nursery and planting operations.

**Research articles and scientific reviews**—Appropriate topics include plant physiology and pathology, seed technology, outplanting performance, habitat restoration, and tree improvement. We also publish Little-Known Classics, minimally distributed papers still pertinent today. You are welcome to submit candidates for this section. We also encourage you to write a “Comments” section. It is a place to publish your opinions and ideas on current issues in the reforestation profession.

In most cases all submitted manuscripts will be reviewed by two reviewers. Research manuscripts submitted for peer-review will be sent to at least two experts in the field.

**When submitting a paper**, send it in hard copy and electronic format.

- ? **Hard copy**—Send a hard copy of your abstract and text, followed in order by references, figure captions, tables, and figures. Except for tables and figures, all text should be double spaced. Send figures—each on a separate page—as clean black-and-white ink drawings or computer-generated graphics that can be scanned. For photographs, include black-and-white prints or color slides.
- ? **Electronic copy**—Send a double-spaced electronic copy via e-mail or on a CD-Rom. The text portions of your document must be IBM-PC compatible, preferably in Microsoft Word for Windows. Refrain from special formatting. Do not use any of the software's special table features. Set up table columns with tabs to ensure translation across platforms. Submit graphics as separate .tif, .jpeg, or .eps files. Do not embed graphics in the document.

**Send the manuscript to** Dr. Robin Rose at [robin.rose@oregonstate.edu](mailto:robin.rose@oregonstate.edu) or to his address at College of Forestry, Oregon State University, Richardson Hall, Corvallis, OR 97330 (Phone: 541-737-6580). Include a cover letter indicating the type of manuscript being submitted (nonresearch or research) and the express delivery mailing address and telephone number of the corresponding author. All authors will be required to submit a signed statement providing permission to publish the paper after acceptance. The editor will notify you of receipt of the manuscript and the result of reviews. Return revisions to the editor at the above address. Page proofs sent after acceptance and layout must be proofread carefully and returned promptly by express mail or delivery service to the address that accompanies the proofs.

**General format**—Include a brief abstract (100 words or less) describing the results and summarizing conclusions. For research papers, use introduction, methods, results, discussion, conclusion, and references. Summarize the usefulness of the findings to practical nursery operations in the conclusion section. Include each author’s job title and professional address in the byline. If the work was done while an author was at another location, please list this in the acknowledgments section.

**Style**—Follow the style of the latest issue. It is generally what has been set forth in *United States Government Printing Office Style Manual* (2000) (ISBN 0-16-050083-4).

- ? Use numerals for any money, time, and measurement and for all numbers above 10.
- ? Abbreviate all units, except those with no numerical value (for example, “results are provided in parts per million” in contrast to “only 0.05 ppm was effective”).
- ? Provide both metric and English units for all values. This can be accomplished for graphs with double axis scales.

**Nomenclature**—Use common names of organisms, if available, in the title, abstract, and text. At first mention in the abstract and in the text, provide the scientific name with authority in parentheses. The taxonomic standard for USDA publications is the Integrated Taxonomic Information System online database at > <http://www.itis.usda.gov/> <. The PLANTS online database is also very useful: > <http://plants.usda.gov/> <.

**References**—Apply the following principles:

- ? List citations in the text by date, oldest first, then alphabetically by author (for example, Roberts 1982; Jones 1984, 1989; Smith and Jones 1990; Roberts 1991; Smith 1991; Smith and others 1999).
- ? In the references section, list references alphabetically by author, then by date, with oldest first. When there are multiple articles by the same author, list first those articles with one author only, oldest first; then list articles with two authors, and so on, alphabetically by second author, oldest first.
- ? For journal articles, use the full journal name, rather than the abbreviated version.
- ? For meeting proceedings, follow the date and location of the meeting with the city of publication and publishing body. If the proceedings are a part of a Government publication series, put that information after the publishing body.
